






Unprecedented increase in poverty levels

MEASURES IMPLEMENTED DURING THE PANDEMIC COVERED HALF OF THE REGION'S POPULATION AND SLOWED THE INCREASE IN POVERTY

263 emergency social protection measures in 2020

Cash and in-kind transfers:

- Estimated population coverage: 49.4%; approximately 84 million households, or 326 million persons
- Innovation: 33 cash transfers covering informal workers
- Total amount announced: US\$ billion
- Amounts represent 1.25% of regional GDP (twice the annual spending on conditional cash transfer programmes and social pensions).










The previous wave of social unrest has shown the need to deeply work on socio-economic inclusion, and on generation of opportunities for the urban youth in segregated cities

- A virtual exchange of ideas and perspectives with young people from informal settlements from Rio de Janeiro (Brazil), Maputo (Mozambique) and Luanda (Angola) took place during the Urban Circuit 2020.
- Communication material was prepared to inform the population of informal settlements in Maceió on Covid19 danger and protective measures.

• A documentary was produced collaboratively by 12 young inhabitants in Informal Settlements in Maceió. The documentary won

two prizes in a local festival.

 - COVID-19 sensitization awareness campaign with print materials in local language.
- Preparation of COVID-19 Protocol for Market and Transport Nodes
 - Data collection through volunteers
 - removal of solid waste and disinfection
- Implementation of the COVID-19 Protocol;
 - Removal of solid waste, establishment of hand washing stations and solid waste collection points at market and transport nodes.
- A joint proposal with UN-Environment accepted "Building the resilience of the poorest in the urban-rural continuum in the southern coast, Haiti, Phase 1".

- 147 temporary jobs created (youth and women)
- 435 m3 bulky waste removed. Flooding first time did not happen



- 171 people reached through the National Urban Forum 2020 (FUN). 49% of the participants were women.
- 786 local authorities are direct beneficiaries from the capacity building programme on the National Action Plan (PAN) for the implementation of the NUA and its application in the urban planning instruments and local projects. 54% of the authorities were women.
- 87 trainers trained in Cuba and qualified to organize training activities for IPF's municipal technicians, 57% of the new trainers are women.

- 4 Municipalities (Cúcuta/Villa del Rosario and Barranquilla in Colombia, Quito in Ecuador, and Lima in Peru) had trained 189 public officials to strengthen urban planning capabilities as well as sensitize them about differentiated conditions presented by refugees and migrants coming from Venezuela and their integration on urban planning tools and strategies.
- The project has supported five Municipalities to strengthen planning instruments with the inclusion of human mobility approach: Metropolitan Plan for Territorial Development and Planning 2020 2030, Land Use and Management Plan in the Metropolitan District of Quito, and Development Plans in Cucuta, Villa del Rosario, and Barranquilla.
- During the COVID-19 crisis, the project has provided emergency Cash-based interventions to an estimated 19.137 people to satisfy fundamental needs during the lockdown phase of the emergency, including housing.








Structuring integrated urban solutions within the framework of the Master Plan Santa Marta 500 years

- Development Plan 2020-2023 of Santa Marta was impacted through technical support that included the Urban Integrated Solutions as strategic projects.
- 1 training session was conducted with local technical staff for the implementation of Integrated Urban Solutions. The capabilities of the technical staff of the local government have been strengthened as a result of training sessions.
- The existing centrality of Pozos Colorados will be consolidated due to the implementation of the profile of the Integrated Urban Solution. It will promote economic dynamism in the city and create new job opportunities by the construction of new infrastructures and the consolidation of an economic agglomeration.







Consolidation of the Human Settlement System of the Manabí Province for Prosperity and Sustainability

Country: Ecuador

- The design of a Territorial Development Financing Facility at the provincial level will provide a legal framework for the consolidation of alliances with private actors and between local governments for the implementation of strategic development projects..
- Portfolio of strategic projects for urban-rural linkages and implement a differentiated approach for the most vulnerable communities.
- 3 municipalities have been beneficiaries from training sessions to support the formulation of land use and management plans (PUGS for its acronym in Spanish).
- 22 municipalities have participated in workshops to present and socialize the approach of the Human settlement system.





National Urban Policy Program in Bolivia

Country: Bolivia

- **Bolivia National Policy for Integral Development of Cities** recognized by the State as a long-term policy. It has been formulated in a participatory and inclusive way, it articulates actions of 15 sectors and three levels of government.
- A system of cities has been developed that allows identifying, characterizing and projecting the 28 cities of the country, territorially linked to 64 Municipalities.
- 25 cities in Bolivia have the calculation of the City Prosperity Index.
- 10 municipalities have initiated urban agendas aligned with the Urban Policy.
- Alliances with 14 civil society organizations specialized in urban issues to accompany their interventions in the territory in line with the Urban Policy.
- 1 municipality has been included in the Global Covenant of Mayors.







BRAZIL & THE SOUTHERN CONE

- 5 projects implemented in 2020
- Generation of evidence and data for urban poverty reduction policies. Qualified, geo-referenced, and accurate information and spatial and disaggregated data about the territories in which UN-Habitat Brazil has projects on the ground, and strengthening of institutional environment for the production, systematization, and use of data by the public authorities in these cities to assist in reducing.
- The 2020 Urban Circuit, held online, hosted 186 events organized by stakeholders from different sectors. All together more than 1,000 speakers from over 20 countries have actively participated. The panels were broadcasted on the <u>Urban Circuit YouTube channel</u> and had over 49,000 views. It was held in partnership with the UN-Habitat offices in Portuguese-speaking African countries
- Partnership with Colab to carry out 2020' edition of Brazil's public consultation on sustainable cities. With over 20,000 responses, 2018 and 2019 editions of the survey which will take place every year until 2030 pointed to adaptation to climate change and access to quality public transportation as the issues of most concern to citizens in Brazil. Promotion of Voluntary Local Report (VLR) with the balance of progress towards achieving the SDGs.

Sustainable and Inclusive Urban Prosperity in the State of Alagoas Phase (1 & 2)

Social Territories in Large Complexes of Slums/Rio de Janeiro – Phase (1 & 2)

- Main goal is to collect data and qualified information to identify vulnerable individuals in large favela complexes of Rio de Janeiro with the lowest rate of social development. The objective is to include the individuals and families to the public services offer of the city.
- 56,360 people benefited from improved access to basic services in 2020 in the 10 large favela complexes of Rio de Janeiro, as 14,090 families entered the integrated protocol from Social Territories Programme. They started to be directly accompanied by the municipality Education, Social and Health Secretariats and monitored by the project.
- 2,091 children referred for enrollment in the municipality's schools.
- 400 pregnant women outside prenatal care were identified during the pandemic and assisted.
- 3,910 basic food baskets and 20,000 hygiene kits delivered to families at high risk.
- 801 families (about 3,204 people) beneficiaries from Social Territories project received



Sustainable Urban and Social Prosperity in the Municipality of Maricá

Country: Brazil

- Maricá's municipality improved its COVID-19 response with inputs from the work "Maricá and COVID-19" compiling spatial and tabular data on 12,623 people distributed in 4,597 households, collected trough door to door interviews. The information, such as the elderly by age group, neighborhood and chronic disease; pregnant women with high multipoverty index; children out of school; and people currently without access to basic income programs, enabled the municipality to guide its response plan to prioritize people based on the data provided.
- Maps were drawn showing the localization of municipal equipment (Health, Education and Social Assistance) georeferenced, to improve logistics during COVID-19 movements restrictions.

- The project will develop innovative knowledge and methodologies, as well as pilot actions aimed at strengthening the social prevention of crime and violence in the state of Pernambuco, emphasizing the promotion of intersectoral actions for the prevention of violence, including improving quality urban spaces, and the integration of the most vulnerable population into these spaces. UN-Habitat will contribute in the first year with women's safety audits and block-by-block workshops.



- 3. Continued strengthening whole-of-the-house approach (RR/GSD) approach in every sub-region in LAC, including the Caribbean
- 4. Combining different business models as per the diversity of context

Differentiated business model

- 1. National financing of services (Ex Mexico, Brazil)
- 2. Official Development Assistance/Traditional donors (Ex. LDC, Lower MIC, humanitarian context) for regional/subregional/country programmes
- 3. Vertical Funds (Ex. Adaptation Fund for the Caribbean)
- 4. Policy Advisory services (Ex. Colombia UNSDCF, other)
