UN-Habitat has been active in the Somalia urban sector for more than 30 years promoting sustainable and participatory urban development while responding to the implementation of Somalia National Development Plan 9 and Somaliland National Development Plan II. UN-Habitat's interventions in Somalia focus on local governance, durable solutions initiatives, shelter and protection in the context of urbanization, improved livelihoods, infrastructure and return and integration linked to durable solutions.

Issues to be addressed.


- z Insufficient capacities (technical, financial, legal frameworks) to deal with continued high urbanization growth rates caused by natural population growth, rural-urban migration and migration due to conflict.
- ^z Displacement at scale as a result of effects of climate change and loss of livelihood opportunities.

SMART CITIES:

z Development of digital policies and strategies that respond to the needs of communities and tap into technological innovations to build the capacities of stakeholders.

z Use of ICT to improve the quality of life of urban communities and build inclusive urban societies

GOVERNANCE

z Enhancing local and national level governance, by improving legal frameworks, reducing corruption, increasing efficiency in public service delivery incl. local revenue generation, development planning and effective finance

management for better service delivery. It allows an enabling environment to better respond to the needs of the Somali society.

INFRASTRUCTURE

z Construction and rehabilitation of sustainable infrastructure, to promote an inclusive and sustainable urbanization process and to initiate catalytic effects for settlement upgrading, planned city extension and urban regeneration.


DURABLE SOLUTIONS AND STABILIZATION

z Focused at the political and economic integration of the Somali youth in the society through education, free speech spaces, and vocational training.

The aim of this project is to mitigate the socioeconomic impact of COVID-19 crisis among IDPs and people living in vulnerable situations in Mogadishu and achieve early stabilization and recovery from effects of the pandemic.

This was done by enhancing the capacity of Banadir Regional Administration to respond to the COVID-19 crisis, improving access to WASH services and reducing the negative socio-economic impact of the most vulnerable, through the provision of cash-transfers.

YOURS project contributes to reduced spatial urban inequalities by promoting sustainable urban regeneration, youth development and reintegration of marginalised communities.

In response to recent droughts, the project has been instrumental in providing water, subsistence and emergency shelters to over 550 IDP families in Baidoa and Kismayo.

In the end, this project will result in the construction of schools and a self-sustaining youth centre with capacity to deliver recreational and livelihoods, 200 permanent housing units with latrines in Baidoa and the rehabilitation of a sport centre for IDP communities.

Saamyenta (impact in Somali) seeks to encourage and identify major investments from private, government, multilateral sources in mixed-use land development packages and urban public works, primarily for basic services, and link these with durable solutions at scale through the resulting land value increments.

The programme aims at harnessing the latter to build the infrastructure benefitting IDPs and other vulnerable DAC members to create more sustainable and inclusive cities. That includes investments in functioning land administration and application of acknowledged tools to improve tenure security and other areas of sustainable land governance.

Hargeisa Urban Water Supply Upgrading Project (HUWSUP)

This project lays a foundation for ensuring increased water supply to the people of Hargeisa. It has replaced over 23 KM of pipeline from the main wellfield of Geed Deeble, with a new highcapacity transmission main to bring more water to Hargeisa. Four additional boreholes have been drilled in the new well field areas of Hora Haadley and Laas Duur and the Geed Deeble wellfield collector has been extended by 7KM to connect the three new water sources.

The project will result in the development of the Batalaale Beachfront in Berbera, closure of the existing dumpsite and construction of a landfill, as well as the development of a Strategic Spatial Plan and Berbera Urban Profile.

*Wellfield means an area of land containing a group of wells that provide drinking water to a public water supply system. 2022 marked the completion of the HUWSUP project which provides the foundation for improved water access for the entire population of Hargeisa city.

The project upgraded Hargeisa's outdated water production and transmission system with new augmented infrastructure.

Main changes and impact of the intervention

- ² Transmission capacity increased from 9,000 m3/day to 24,000 m3/day (on completion) as the diameter of main transmission line was increased from 300mm to 600mm.
- Increased lifespan of pipeline system and pumping facilities from a lifespan of 5 years of old infrastructure to the new lifespan on 40 years.
- **80 percent** reduction of water losses along ^Z pipeline route.
- Z More than **14,500 households** that were previously not served by the piped system will have gained access to an improved water source operated by Hargeisa Water Agency.
- z UN-Habitat has linked the Hargeisa water agency with The Global Water Operators' Partnerships Alliance (GWOPA) with the objective of strengthening their capacity, enhancing their performance and enabling them to provide a better service to more people.

	Promotion of the youth agenda through development of regulatory frameworks that increase the democratic participation of the youth in politics, (45% youth in SouthWest state parliament and 27% in Jubaland),amplification of youth' voices where over 350,000 youth across Somalia have utilized innovative technologies to achieve this and creation of One Stop Youth centers in Kismayo and Mogadishu.
	Supported the drafting and approval process of the Urban Land Management Law for Southwest State which incorporates human rights prospective for displaced people



Endorsement of the approved Urban Land Management Law by the Puntland Government which will for the first time establish clear guidelines on the governance, and management of urban land.

2022 ACHIEVEMENTS



More than 14,000 households in Hargeisa town previously not served by the water pipeline now have access to an improved water source-through installation of 23KM of main water pipeline, new pumping stations, installation of water pumps and power generators and drilling, equipping and connection of three new boreholes at Hora Hadley.



Supported the formulation and validation of the Somaliland Urban Waste Management Policy.



203 solar powered streetlights installed on the road leading to Batalaale public Beach in Berbera, Somaliland making it safer for all. To ensure sustainability, 10 technical municipal staff were trained on installation and maintenance of the panels.



Promoted access of healthcare in Mogadishu through the rehabilitation of 4 primary healthcare facilities (Abdiaziz, Waberi, Halane and Shibis Health Centers) and supply of general and specialized medical equipment.



Provision of ambulance services in Mogadishu where 1,556 patients with symptoms of COVID-19 were referred to the main referral hospitals in Mogadishu.



Development and launch of the Baidoa City Strategy which will guide the developments in the interest of all parties of the rapidly urbanizing city towards sustainable urban growth.



LESSONS LEARNT

- ^z Secondary cities do not have sufficient attention at national levels even though they experience rapid growth.
- z Lack of sufficient funding to support implementation of tools developed such as development briefs, master plans, city wide strategies.
- Strengthening coordination mechanisms is critical at both horizontal and vertical levels to ^z operationalize the Humanitarian-Development-Peace building nexus.

Own source revenue is a vehicle for increasing access to basic service delivery.

Joint Programming is essential to leverage UN-Habitat comparative advantage across the
UN System.
