Follow up to the UNHA Resolutions Action plan and Roadmap to 2025

Resolution on Enhancing the Interlinkage between Urbanization and Climate Change Resilience (HSP/HA.2/Res.5)

Version 1 - [20 October 2023]

This Roadmap has been prepared by the UN-Habitat Secretariat to reflect on the resolution on Enhancing the Interlinkage between Urbanization and Climate Change Resilience (HSP/HA.2/Res.5), adopted at the second session of the United Nations Habitat Assembly on 09 June 2023. The Resolution was championed by the Group of African States and Pakistan and adopted by acclamation. This Action Plan will be adjusted and updated, as needed and relevant, during the course of implementation of the resolution.

Overview of resolution

The resolution's preambular paragraphs recall the relevance and interdependencies of resolution-based intergovernmental frameworks for sustainable urbanization and climate change resilience such as the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development with specific reference to the Sustainable Development Goals 9, 11, 13 and 17, the New Urban Agenda, the Addis Ababa Action Agenda, the Paris Agreement, and the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction. This resolution is put in context with the findings of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change under the Sixth Assessment Cycle recognizing the importance of local and subnational authorities and actors in addressing climate risks, reducing greenhouse gas emissions, and adapting to climate change. Underlining the importance of multilevel and cooperative action, the resolution acknowledges the first Ministerial Meeting on Urbanization and Climate Change and the integrated launch of the Sustainable Urban Resilience for the next Generation (SURGe) initiative. The resolution's operational paragraphs request the Executive Director, subject to the availability of resources and in line with UN-Habitat's mandate, to further enhance the linkage between urbanization and climate change to contribute to the objectives of the UNFCCC and the Paris Agreement. It encourages to continue the practice of organizing Ministerial Meetings on Urbanization and Climate Change at the margins of UNFCCC COPs. It further requests the Executive Director to develop options and recommendations for operationalizing the SURGe Initiative for the Executive Board's consideration, as well as expand the cooperation between different levels of government (multilevel climate action) to enhance inclusion of locallevel contributions in and the implementation of new and updated nationally determined contributions. It requests further to continue scaling up the Resilient Settlements for the Urban Poor (RISE UP) Flagship Programme.

Requests for UN-Habitat

- To further enhance the linkage between urbanization and climate change in the work of UN-Habitat in order to contribute to the objectives of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the Paris Agreement.
- To continue the practice of organizing meetings, including ministerial meetings as appropriate, following the organization of the Ministerial Meeting on Urbanization and Climate Change held in the margins of the twenty-seventh Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change;
- To inform the Executive Board, and subsequently develop options and recommendations for operationalizing the SURGe initiative as a meaningful institutional arrangement for the Executive Board to consider;



- 4. To support initiatives aimed at enhancing the capacity of communities to face and adapt to the adverse impacts of climate change and related loss and damage,
- 5. To scale up the RISE-UP: Resilient Settlements for the Urban Poor flagship programme.
- 6. To continue efforts to mobilize resources; disseminate information on innovations, good practices and policies relating to climate action; and support Member States in this regard
- 7. Provide **updates to the Executive Board** at its regular sessions, starting from the first session of 2024, on the implementation of the present resolution, including any challenges encountered, and to propose further measures as needed.

Requests for Member States and other actors

8. Encourages Member States to expand cooperation between different levels of government (multilevel climate action) in order to enhance inclusion of local-level contributions in new and updated nationally determined contributions and support the implementation of nationally determined contributions at the local level.

Relationship with prior and existing mandates, resolutions (Governing Council, GA, UNHA, etc)

The draft resolution directly links to the **2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development** and its relevant goals including **SDGs 11, 13 and 17**. Moreover, it aligns with the vision, principles, and commitments of the **New Urban Agenda**, in particular with **paragraphs 63, 64 and 79**.

The resolution refers to the Ministerial Meeting on Urbanization and Climate Change¹, under the COP27 Presidency, where the Sustainable Urban Resilience for the next Generation (SURGe)² initiative was launched. The initiative was developed in collaboration with UN-Habitat and facilitated by ICLEI and continues to be part of UN-Habitat's work programme with a 2030 vision that focuses on effective multilevel governance to transform cities to be healthy, sustainable, just, inclusive, low-emission and resilient urban systems for a better urban future for all.

It is also important to note that the **Twelfth Session of World Urban Forum** will be hosted in the city of Cairo, the Arab Republic of Egypt. This opportunity will allow to coordinate further efforts in enhancing the linkage between urbanization and climate change in collaboration with Member States.

Further, the Ministerial declaration of the United Nations Habitat Assembly at its second session emphasizes the importance of multilateralism for "just urban pathways for environmental action and sustainable consumption and production and ways in which integrated and participatory urban climate action, measures to curb waste and pollution, and biodiversity action can be strengthened through the relevant global, regional and local initiatives that enhance the interlinkage between urbanization and climate change"³

Relevant previous UN-Habitat resolutions and decisions

1. Requests the Executive Director to increase awareness of the role of cities in addressing climate change, with particular emphasis on the impact of climate change on the urban poor and in achieving the Millennium Development Goals and sustainable development;

2. Invites Governments which are in the position to do so to provide technical and financial support to the Cities and Climate Change Initiative, to widen the geographical scope of the initiative and to expand the range of capacity-development approaches in order to support local authorities in addressing climate change;

Implementing the resolution through the UN-Habitat Strategic Plan 2020-25

In relation to UN-Habitat's work, this draft resolution lines up to its **Strategic Plan 2020-2025** third domain of change namely **Strengthened climate action and improved urban environment** and the **Executive Director's priorities 2022-2023**, particularly on **cities and climate change:** the emergency and the response **by cities**. In addition, one of UN-Habitat's five global flagship programmes, **RISE UP – Resilient Settlement for the Urban Poor** is directly related to this resolution. The objective of the flagship programme is to leverage large scale investment to build urban adaptation and climate resilience in the hotspots of vulnerability globally. The resolution requests the Executive Director to **enhance the linkage between urbanization and climate change in the work of UN-Habitat** thus mainstreaming of climate action is to be further advanced across all Subprogrammes, Flagship Programmes and other global programmes as well as the workplans of all organizational units.

Fundraising strategy and key opportunities

PBI: For this resolution the programme budget implications have been kept to an absolute minimum with an emphasis on the interagency and partner coordination as well as the monitoring and reporting of the resolution.

The implementation of the resolution, in particular the operationalization of the SURGe Initiative, the further scaling up of the RISE UP initiative and the institutionalizing of multilevel governance will require significant additional resources. The enhancement of the linkages between urbanization and climate change in the work of UN-Habitat will require additional coordination, including in the development of the 2026-2029 Strategic Plan, and reprogramming of projects, programmes and Subprogrammes.

The emerging fundraising strategy is comprised of the following:

- SURGe work packages have been developed and engagement options have been shared with key partners and will be shared with member states.
- RISE UP a resource mobilization strategy is under development and has been informally presented to vertical climate funds.
- UN-Habitat's Scalability model further supports the rollout of SURGe and Rise UP
- Regional Climate Change and Urban Environment strategies are under development by regional offices.
- A frameworks agreement with the Green Climate Fund for readiness proposals and the accreditation as multilateral implementing entity is underway.

Key opportunities for resource mobilization:

- Better knowledge management (global analyses portfolio and project outcomes) and better communication of the climate change related work of UN-Habitat (on the website, and through social media) which further highlights the specific role/niche of UN-Habitat capacities and achievements to date and the impact which additional resources could bring.
- UN-Habitat is increasingly engaging in key climate events (the Climate Change COPs being the most prominent) to highlight the importance of inclusive and effective multilateralism, international cooperation, multilevel and urban climate action and the role that UN-Habitat plays.
- Through operationalizing SURGe, UN-Habitat considers paragraph 13b of the UNHA-2 Ministerial Declaration to "Explore just urban pathways for environmental action and sustainable consumption and production and ways in which integrated and participatory urban climate action, measures to curb waste and pollution, and biodiversity action can be strengthened through the relevant global, regional and local initiatives that enhance the interlinkage between urbanization and climate change".⁴
- Engagement with key partners such as the Global Covenant of Mayors for Climate and Energy which
 represents more than 12,000 cities that have committed to addressing climate change and the Local
 Government and Municipal Authorities constituency to the UNFCCC.
- A cutting edge Environmental and Social Safeguards System as well as a strengthened Environmental Management System which will strengthen the confidence of member states and partners in UN-Habitat's project delivery and institutional environmental performance.

Challenges or gaps foreseen in the implementation of the Resolution

The primary challenge relates to Operational Paragraph (OP) 6 which refers to the mobilization of resources; dissemination of information on innovations, good practices and policies relating to climate action; and the support Member States in this regard. Whilst there is strongly expressed demand for support, the required resources for urban climate action, including adaptation and mitigation over the coming decade is in the range of trillions of US Dollars. In order for UN-Habitat to play its role, significant additional extra-budgetary resources need to be mobilized to supplement current Sub-Programme 3 funding.

 Challenges relative to Operational Paragraph 2 (and by extension OP 7), relating to the Ministerial Meeting and advancing Multilevel Climate Action include: limited capacities or mandates of Housing and Urban Development Ministries, and related urban Ministries in some countries to engage on climate action and to do so at the global level. Endorsement of Ministerial Meetings is subject to a COP Presidency buy-in.

- Challenges relative to Operational Paragraph 3: (and by extension OP 1) on SURGe and the linkage
 between urbanization and climate change in the work of UN-Habitat include: The programme
 depends on a wide range of partners. Whilst the initiative explicitly works with a very large number
 of key urban climate change stakeholders, there is some competition and the narrative of the
 comparative advantage of a global, member states endorsed initiative is yet to be fully
 communicated.
- Challenges relative to Operational Paragraph 5: (and by extension OP 4) on the RISE UP flagship and
 community resilience include the perceived overlap with other initiatives. UN-Habitat will redouble
 efforts in working with Member States to highlight the synergies. Diversifying the donor-base for RISE
 UP portfolio needs donor commitment for climate resilience for the most vulnerable urban poor.
