

#### **Third Session of the Executive Board 2023**

The third session of the Executive Board of UN-Habitat convened from 28 to 30 November 2023, marking a significant return to fully in-person proceedings after the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic. The Board approved UN-Habitat's work programme 2024 and a four million USD non-earmarked budget for the United Nations Habitat and Human Settlements Foundation. This decision, accompanied by the endorsement of a fully costed scalable model, signifies a realistic yet ambitious

financial framework supporting UN-Habitat's mandates.

The Board has also endorsed the draft terms of reference of the **urban action funding window,** an innovative funding mechanism to utilise the unspent earmarked balance for implementing United Nations Habitat Assembly resolutions in a balanced manner. The Board encourages Member States to voluntarily contribute regularly to the Foundation.

Several weeks ago, the world bid farewell to another inspiring **Urban October** that saw 358 events organized in 176 cities in 60 countries, including 204 Urban Circuit events in Brazil. The month started with World Habitat Day on 2 October and ended on 31 October with World Cities Day.

The city of Baku, Azerbaijan hosted this year's Global Observance of **World Habitat Day** under the theme "Resilient urban economies. Cities as drivers of growth and recovery", which sought to deeply examine how cities can position their economies to benefit residents.

The Municipality of Üsküdar in Istanbul, Türkiye, hosted **World Cities Day 2023** under the theme "Financing sustainable urban future for all".

Leaders of sovereign wealth funds, development finance institutions, the private sector, and government representatives explored tools and mechanisms to bridge the urban investment gap and discussed the strategies that national and local governments can adopt to move towards a circular economy.



# UN-Habitat calls for expressions of interest to host the Global Observances of World Habitat Day and World Cities Day 2025

#### **Scroll of Honour Award**

At the Global Observance of World Habitat Day, UN-Habitat presented its prestigious **Scroll of Hon-our Award**, which recognizes initiatives and individuals who have made outstanding contributions to sustainable urbanization and improving the quality of urban life.

5 candidates selected from a pool of over 80 nominees received the award this year including Assembleia de Moradores, Ecovironment, Fundación ProEmpleo, Fundo Imobiliário Comunitário para Aluguel and the Dubai Municipality.

# **UN-Habitat and Shanghai co-organize third SDG Cities Global Conference**


**Shanghai, China, 30 October 2023** - Over 1,300 participants attended the third SDG Cities Global Conference on 28-30 October under the title "Accelerating SDG Implementation at Scale", co-hosted by UN-Habitat, the Ministry of Housing and Urban-Rural Development of the People's Republic of China, and Shanghai Municipal People's Government China, with support from Tongji University. Highlighting the UN Secretary-General's warning about SDGs veering off course as indicated in the advance unedited version of the **annual report on SDG progress** released by the United Nations in early 2023, the conference aimed to mobilize local, national, and international forces to discuss how the **SDG Cities Global Initiative** can contribute to accelerating actions through digital tools, regional and national technical support hubs, and finance instruments.

UN-Habitat's Executive Director emphasized collaboration's potency, while the SDG Cities Initiative Lead stressed the critical role of cities in sustainable development. The event emphasized a tailored approach for urban SDG implementation, showcasing success stories. It advocated for national-local collaborations to address diverse city needs and launched initiatives aligning with World Cities Day, aiming to establish a Local Finance Framework for sustainable urban growth.





# To live in one's own house in Yemen: How mediation resolved eightyear long illegal occupation

When Mohammad Tayeb purchased his home in Aden in 2015, he never thought the war would force him and his family out of the city – and equally force him to leave their house behind.

A few years later, upon returning to Aden's Khormaksar district, Mohammad found out that his house had been illegally occupied.

"I went to inspect my house and found parts of it renovated and prepared for habitation. I was shocked to see children playing in front of my house", Mohammad says.

Determined to reclaim his house, Mohammad decided to resort to tribal mediation, a process by which conflict between opposing parties or individuals is informally brought before tribal leaders, or anyone with a good reputation. His efforts failed, and the situation escalated between him and the occupying family.

As part of the "Support to Housing, Land and Property (HLP) Rights for Vulnerable Communities and Improve Land Tenure Security of Women in Yemen" project, a mediator was deployed on 4 August 2023 to attempt conciliation. The project, funded by UN-Habitat and implemented by the National Foundation for Development and Humanitarian Response (NFDHR), aims to **resolve housing, land, and property disputes through mediation**.



# **UN-Habitat and the European Union in Burkina Faso support to the IDPs**

**Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso**; Burkina Faso has over one Million internally displaced persons causing population increase in some cities as insecurity forced many to flee their homes. Despite the generosity of the host communities, there is a lack of adequate housing and other basic services and commodities, including water, sanitation and food.

UN-Habitat through the support of European Union provided **2,000 internally displaced families in Burkina Faso with new housing units** through the **project implemented using the integrated area-based approach**. This included the construction of health, education, and water infrastructure and facilities for energy supply. In addition, improved public spaces, sanitation (through enhanced waste management, among other aspects), and creation of livelihood opportunities for the vulnerable populations, both host and displaced, through the construction of houses and related infrastructure.



#### **Urban October in Latin America and the Caribbean**

As we bid farewell to another inspiring Urban October in Latin America and the Caribbean, we are excited to share with you the highlights from this year's celebration of urban sustainability in the region.

#### **Brazil**

This year, UN-Habitat Brazil "Urban Circuit" hosted over 200 events with 700 panelists and more than 5,800 broadcast hours. The circuit is carried out since 2018.

#### **Central America and Dominican Republic**

- To accelerate the implementation of the NUA, we presented the Report on the State of Cities in CA and the Dominican Republic, the Guide for Developing and Updating National Urban Policies, and the first number of the Habitat & Housing Magazine.
- Honduras conducted its first National Urban Forum with the support of UN-Habitat to disseminate and encourage the implementation of the country's National and Territorial Urban Policy, currently in development.

#### Cuba

As a tradition each year, **Cuba** commemorates its National Urban Forum in sync with the World Cities Day. The culmination of its tenth Forum was marked with a remarkable 31-day journey of daily activities, starting with the World Habitat Day.

#### Mexico

- Mexico will host the global observance ceremony of the World Habitat Day 2024 in the city of Queretaro.
- UN-Habitat introduced the HerCity Guide, in Spanish, jointly presented online by UN-Habitat and its region partners to empowering communities.

## African and Asian officials meet near Indonesia's new capital to discuss national spatial planning progress and challenges

On 6-8 November 2023, the sixth edition of the Spatial Planning Platform (SPP) Conference convened in Balikpapan City, East Kalimantan Province, Indonesia. The SPP partners met in February 2023 already in Kathmandu and reconvened now in Indonesia, with great delight.


SPP is an initiative of the Ministry of Land, Infrastructure, Transport, and Tourism (MLIT) of Japan and is supported by UN-Habitat's Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific (ROAP) in Fukuoka.

Senior officials from no less than 16 countries, including Bangladesh, Bhutan, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Kenya, Lao PDR, Mongolia, Mozambique, Nepal, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Uganda came in-person to Indonesia for the event. Concurrent efforts to strengthen National Urban Policies were highlighted by OECD and UN-Habitat representatives.


