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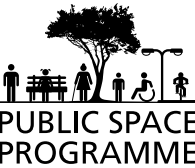

A MESSAGE FROM OUR UN-HABITAT ACTING EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



SDG 11.7: By 2030, provide universal access to safe, inclusive and accessible, green and public spaces, in particular for women and children, older persons and persons with disabilities.

As we unveil the 2023 Global Public Space Programme annual report, I want to remark on the vital importance of public space in shaping sustainable, inclusive, and vibrant urban futures and the key milestones achieved this year.

Public spaces serve as platforms for social interaction, economic exchange, cultural expression, and environmental sustainability. As urbanisation intensifies, the significance of public spaces has only increased, emphasising the need for immediate and joint actions.

This year, our report reflects on public space initiatives not only from our Global Public Space Programme but also led by our Regional Offices and Country Offices. The intention is to share an agency-wide unified report to underscore our commitment to collaboration and integrated action. Across the globe, our teams and partners have worked diligently to implement innovative public space projects, engage communities, and advocate for better urban policies, prioritising equitable and inclusive public space development.

This year, we celebrate a remarkable achievement – the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) indicator 11.7.1, pivotal in ensuring universal access to safe, inclusive, and accessible green and public spaces by 2030, particularly for vulnerable groups, has been elevated to Tier I status.

This significant progress was officially announced at the SDG Summit in New York. The transition from Tier 2 to Tier 1 signifies that this indicator now has a clear conceptual framework and internationally established methodology and that over 50% of countries in relevant regions regularly produce data for it.

This advancement reflects UN-Habitat's dedicated efforts in mobilising data production across countries, demonstrating global commitment and progress towards this goal by in-house colleagues and generous donors. This achievement recognises the centrality of public spaces in achieving the ambitious 2030 agenda and reinforces the importance of collaborative efforts in achieving global sustainability goals.

I want to express my deepest gratitude to our partners, stakeholders, and dedicated staff for their invaluable contributions. Your support and collaboration are the cornerstones of our success. As we move forward, let us carry the momentum gained and continue championing the cause of public spaces. Together, we can create more resilient, inclusive, and sustainable urban environments that cater to the needs and aspirations of all, especially the most vulnerable.

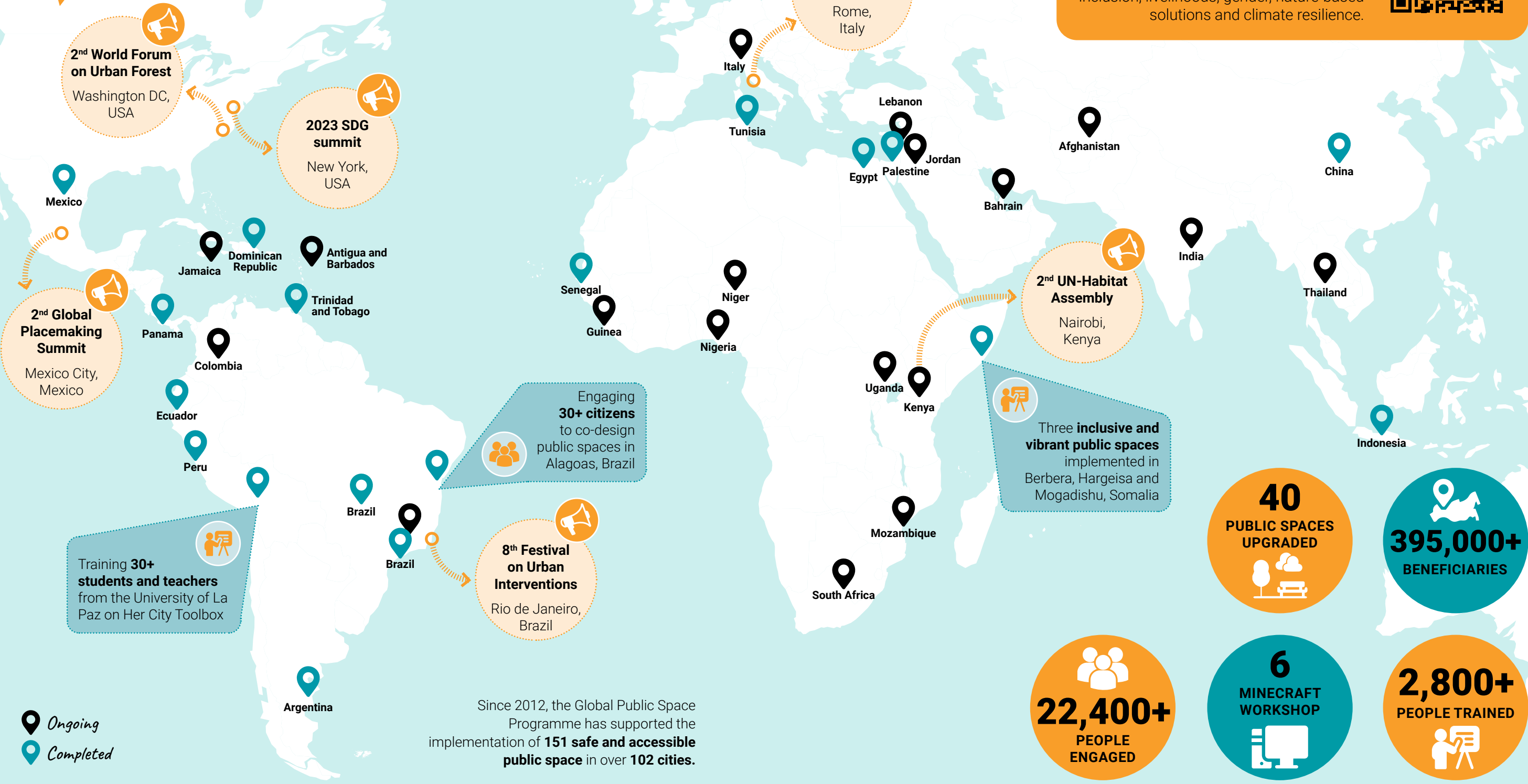

The Ciudad Juárez 2040 Vision comes to life with impactful tactical urbanism interventions, as around 200 community volunteers transform iconic sites into vibrant public spaces. Through collaborative art and urban design, the city blooms with identity and community engagement. People are at the heart of decision-making, aiming for the proposed interventions to trigger broader changes, reclaim the city's common character, and enhance the sense of urban life. This participatory approach reflects the city's commitment to the Global Agendas, propelling Ciudad Juárez towards a more connected and lively urban future.

REVITALIZING AL-KHALIFA MARKET: A COMMUNITY- DRIVEN TRANSFORMATION

Location: Cairo, Egypt
Partner: Megawra-Built Environment Collective
Donor: Block by Block Foundation
Budget: 68,650 USD

In the historic Cairo's Al-Khalifa, a community-driven project revitalized the market, enhancing its social and economic role. Over 300 residents, including youth, participated in redesigning the space using tools like Block by Block methodology (Minecraft for Participatory Urban Design). The initiative improved market accessibility, integrated waste management, and preserved cultural heritage, significantly boosting the area's vibrancy and sustainability while empowering residents to shape their neighbourhood's future.

SUSTAINABLE CITIES: NEW URBAN AGENDA OF THE PROVINCE OF NEUQUÉN

Location: Villa El Chocón, Aluminé y Rincón de los Sauces, Neuquén, Argentina

Partners: Province of Neuquén: Secretariat of Planning and Action for Development (COPADE), Undersecretariat of Public Works, the Ministry of Women and Diversity; and local municipalities

Donor: Argentina Federal Investment Council

Budget: 91,200 USD

The project analysed the quality of three public spaces and developed conceptual design proposals in three cities to make them socially inclusive, integrated, connected, environmentally sustainable and safe. These site-specific assessments are part of the "Sustainable Cities: New Urban Agenda of the Province of Neuquén" project, a joint initiative of UN-Habitat, UNOPS and UN Women, in collaboration with the provincial government. The public spaces were assessed according to tailored indicators linked to accessibility, sustainability, comfort and security, amenities, use and users. Three participatory workshops were held to evaluate and co-design the spaces, engaging with 45 women and 30 men aged between 18 to 85. Design elements that promote social integration, nature-based solutions and gender equality, including, were incorporated to address the challenges highlighted by the community, the local governments and the provincial government.

Her City Toolbox is a joint initiative managed by UN-Habitat and Shared City Foundation. We aim to promote safe, inclusive, and accessible public spaces, starting with girls. Through a 9-step methodology, Her City Toolbox guides local authorities, professionals and community members on including the female perspective in urban planning and design processes. From assessment to implementation, Her City provides a set of digital tools to engage and empower women and girls in the development of public spaces. WOMEN BUILDERS: URBAN TRANSFORMATIONS, DISASTER PREVENTION, AND FEMALE EMPOWERMENT

The Women Builders Initiative has catalysed urban regeneration and promoted female financial independence in the districts of La Ensanada and Pamplona Alta. Over 135 women joined forces to improve the conditions of four public spaces, integrating green and urban agriculture areas and enhancing the accessibility of the neighbourhoods. The initiative has also launched the “Pact for Public Spaces” to create a committed network and advocate for better local urban policy for public space development.

GREEN RESILIENCE TO TACKLE FOOD SECURITY AMID UKRAINE-RUSSIA CONFLICT

Location: Tunis and Marsa, Tunisia

Food security has been a rising concern in Tunisia as a consequence of the Ukraine-Russia war. UN-Habitat partnered with Tunis and La Marsa municipalities to create productive vegetable gardens in the green parks of the urban fabric. The initiative engaged and trained over 100 community members, particularly aiding vulnerable groups and migrants with food access through digital platforms and local NGOs. The project's positive impact can be witnessed by the community members' widespread adoption of urban agriculture principles, with participants extending sustainable gardening practices into their households, enhancing domestic food security.

FROM VACANT TO VIBRANT: CO-DESIGNING AN ACCESSIBLE RIVERFRONT

Location: Solo, Indonesia

In the vibrant city of Solo, Indonesia, a groundbreaking initiative, Rivers as Inclusive Common Space, is reshaping public space development along the Kali Pepe Riverbank. The project focuses on transforming neglected riverbanks into inclusive and resilient public spaces. The Mangkubumen Harmony Park, emerging from this endeavour, is a testament to the power of community engagement, involving over 60 residents in every design stage through innovative tools like Minecraft. This park, a beacon of inclusivity, now benefits 320 residents, showcasing accessibility with ramps and handrails. Heartwarming stories from residents like Gancar and Fitri highlight the tangible impact, turning a once-vacant space into a haven for soccer, badminton, and community bonding. The success of this project ripples beyond, influencing national housing development and serving as a model for future inclusive public spaces in Surakarta.

COMMUNITY AT THE CORE: URBAN TRANSFORMATION THROUGH TACTICAL URBANISM

Location: San Nicolas de los Garza, Monterrey, Mexico

San Nicolás de los Garza's transformation started with the Public Space Strategy, implemented by UN-Habitat and the local government. Tactical urbanism interventions have brought immediate changes and set the stage for long-term revitalization. 640 people, 455 women and 182 men, have joined together to generate lively, inclusive, and functional urban areas. The strategy also includes a Public Space Toolkit and a Tactical Urbanism Plan encompassing design guidelines and event programming that reflect the community's needs. This initiative exemplifies a new paradigm in urban transformation, where residents lead the planning and execution toward more inclusive, safe, and dynamic public spaces in Monterrey's metropolitan area.

IMPROVING THE *health* AND WELL-BEING OF YOUNG PEOPLE

YOUNG GAMECHANGERS INITIATIVE



About Young Gamechangers Initiative

Despite being one of the most active users of public spaces and having a significant stake in the future, young people often need to be adequately represented in urban governance processes. With 55% of the global population currently residing in urban areas and an expected increase to 68% by 2050, it is predicted that up to 60% of all city dwellers will be under 18 by 2030 (UN-Habitat, 2023). To address this issue, it is essential to create appropriate mechanisms and participatory tools, including digital technologies, that increase youth involvement in urban governance. The Young Gamechangers Initiative proposes to tackle these challenges by focusing on the following pillars:

Youth governance

Strengthening governance frameworks to advance the health and well-being of young people.

Digital engagement

Empower young people with voice and agency and equip them with the right digital skills to engage in governance.

Inclusive public spaces

Supporting local authorities to deliver public spaces that are youth-friendly, safe, accessible and inclusive

In 2023, we achieved several significant milestones. We elaborated a comprehensive participation plan, ensuring a structured and inclusive approach to our initiative. Additionally, we developed a robust communication strategy to disseminate information and engage with our target audience effectively. We outlined a framework for evidence-gathering and monitoring and designed a detailed project-specific Data management and privacy plan. We conducted productive meetings with implementing partners and engaged relevant stakeholders to enhance the project's success.



Global Research Challenge

**VISION 2030 IN ACTION:
CO-CREATING PUBLIC SPACES
IN ALAGOAS**

Two initiatives were carried out in Alagoas to promote inclusive public spaces as part of the umbrella project Alagoas Vision 20230, which intends to create innovative and integrated solutions for a better and more inclusive future of the State. First, a urban park was constructed in a low-income housing complex in the capital Maceió. Then, through the initiative Cidade 2030, UN-Habitat conducted a series of workshops in the four municipalities of Maragogi, Penedo, Santana do Ipanema e União dos Palmares, to define a vision and public space design solutions. Residents, public managers, and students actively participated, utilising innovative design methods.

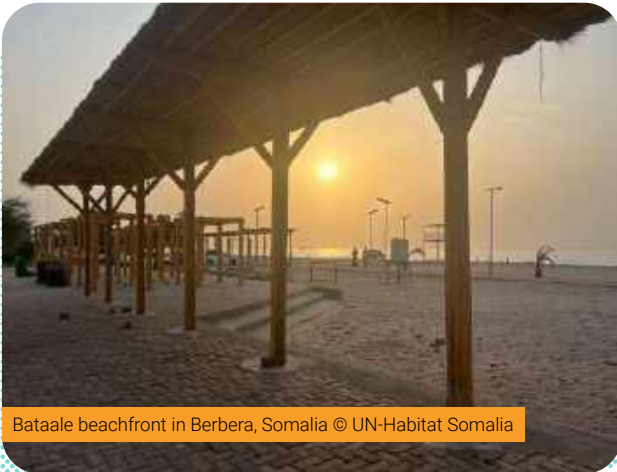

AN INCLUSIVE PUBLIC SPACE
FOR ALL**

Location: Berbera, Somalia
Partner: UN-Habitat Somalia, Berbera Municipality
Donor: European Union

UN-Habitat implemented the Batalaale beachfront, a vibrant and inclusive public space for all. The public beach now integrates pedestrian pathways, shaded areas, benches, playgrounds and outdoor gym installations to ensure everyone feels welcome. Located three kilometers north of the city centre, the municipality improved the beach accessibility by rehabilitating the connecting road. The initiative intends to demonstrate the potential of the Berbera Strategic Development Plan through pilot projects.

INTEGRATING *Nature-based solutions* FOR URBAN RESILIENCE AND CLIMATE ADAPTATION IN KENYA

Nature-based solutions (NbS) are crucial for addressing environmental challenges, including climate change, biodiversity loss, water scarcity and pollution. They often offer cost-effective alternatives to traditional infrastructure, fostering resilience and enhancing ecosystem services. Embracing nature-based approaches in policy-making and urban planning processes can lead to more resilient and equitable societies while safeguarding natural resources.

Kenya has become a pioneer in developing urban strategies to promote urban resilience and climate adaptation, focusing on blue solutions for coastal ecosystems and river regeneration. Various stakeholders are getting together through public-private partnerships to steer the future of Nairobi rivers' basins and coastal adaptation.

RECLAIMING STREETS FOR PEDESTRIANS AND CYCLISTS IN AFRICA

Location: Maputo and Quelimane (Mozambique), Nairobi, Kisumu, Mombasa, Nakuru (Kenya), Addis Ababa, Hawassa, Bahir Dar (Ethiopia), Kigali (Rwanda), Conakry (Guinea)

Budget: 500,000 USD

The project enhanced road safety in 11 African cities by improving pedestrian and cycling infrastructure and promoting physical activities and soft mobility. The project's success is evident by the drop in road traffic-related deaths in selected countries to below the African annual average of 26.6 deaths per 100,000 inhabitants. This was achieved through accelerated efforts of governments and financiers in policy development, local implementation action and investments to design safer streets and create livable public spaces. A series of trainings, engagement workshops and tactical placemaking activities were conducted to strengthen local authorities' awareness of road safety. Two documents reflecting on policy recommendations and design guidelines for Kenyan and Ethiopian cities were developed.

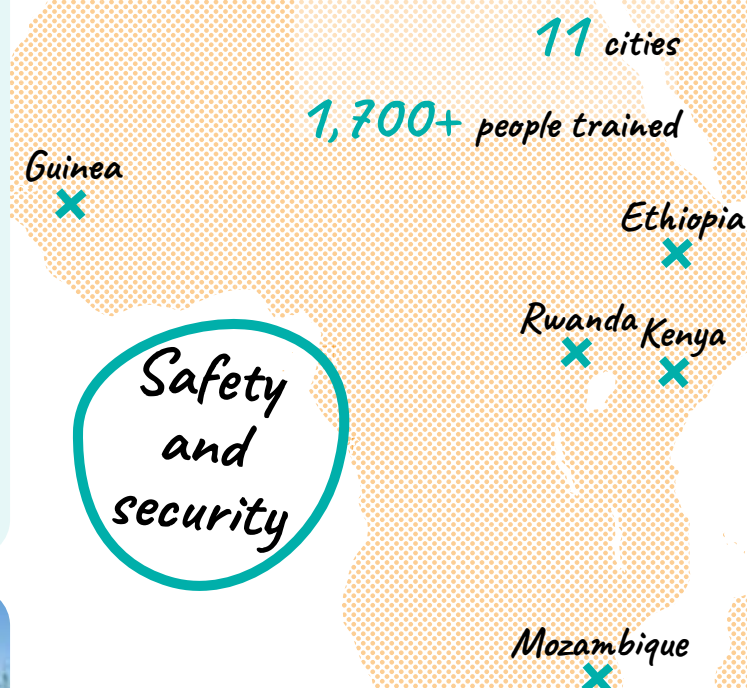

INTEGRATING NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS ALONG DONGHU EAST LAKE

Location: Wuhan, China

Partners: UN-Habitat ROAP, Administrative Committee of Wuhan East Lake Scenic Area

Donor: Wuhan Natural Resources Conservation and Utilisation Center (NRCU)

The project assessed the conditions of the Donghu East Lake scenic area to strengthen its social, ecological and connectivity functions and promote carbon neutrality for the enhanced well-being of its residents. Over 90 trained data collectors have assessed 282 public spaces along the lakeshore using the application Kobo toolbox. Overall, the public spaces along Donghu East Lake are well-equipped, with good comfort and safety levels. The area is a tourism epicentre in Wuhan and contributes to reducing the urban heat island effects. Improvements are required regarding connectivity with the surrounding residential areas and integration of nature-based solutions. Based on the findings, the project provides strategic recommendations targeting five key action areas: universal accessibility, greenways, thematic tourism, regeneration of critical public space, and ecological function of the scenic area.

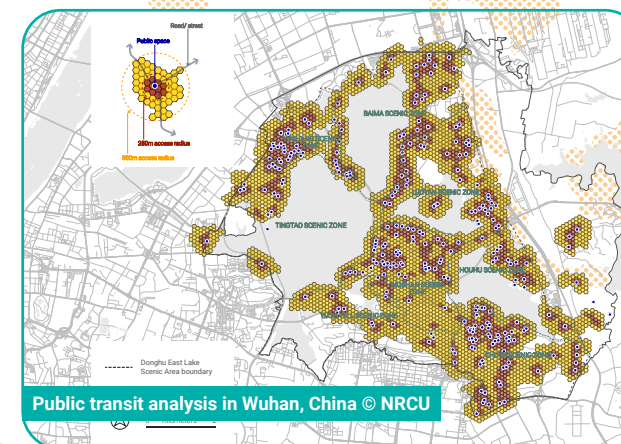

LIVING STREETS AT JARDIM FELICIDADE: STREETS AS VIBRANT AND ATTRACTIVE PUBLIC SPACES

Location: Belo Horizonte, Brazil
Partners: Nossa Belo Horizonte, Jardim Felicidade Municipal School, Belo Horizonte City Hall, Onça River Watershed Committee, Sanitation and Water Agency - COPASA

Budget: 20,000USD

Ruas de Estar project, in collaboration with Belo Horizonte Municipality, is part of the Urban Pathways programme. The initiative transformed a motorized avenue into a livable and vibrant pedestrian area located on the banks of the Tamboril stream, around the water spring “Nascente da Felicidade”. The new promenade integrates accessible sidewalks, shaded seating areas, playgrounds, and safe zebra crossing, allowing residents, school students, and visitors to hang out and meet. The water stream running close by increases the attractiveness of the area, while the reduced motorized traffic has a positive impact on the water quality and pollution.

TOWARDS INCLUSIVE CITIES: PROMOTING *social inclusion* OF MIGRANTS COMMUNITIES

About Inclusive cities, communities of solidarity

Since 2015, more than 5 million refugees and migrants have fled Venezuela, seeking a new life in the surrounding countries and communities. The initiative is an inter-agency collaboration between UNHCR, IOM and UN-Habitat, supported by the European Union, that seeks to promote social and economic inclusion of refugees and migrants and increase the resilience of host communities in six Latin American and Caribbean countries. Among the project outcomes, the initiative leverages the opportunities of inclusive public spaces and participatory tactical urbanism interventions to build social cohesion between host communities and migrants while building platforms for cultural exchange and economic empowerment.

The initiative developed an Urban Inclusion Marker, which is a georeferenced index that allows the measurement of a city's aggregated level of inclusion and its potential contribution to the spatial, social, economic and cultural integration of its inhabitants.

Territorial Scale Intervention Plan

9 Territorial Scale Intervention Plans were developed, comprising over 500 actions identified by the communities to enhance integration across topics like housing, education, health, public space, job opportunities and governance. Over 200 actions have been implemented.

KNOWLEDGE DEVELOPMENT

Over the years, UN-Habitat has developed a series of normative and operational tools to support local and national governments and other partners in scaling up efforts to achieve SDG goal 11.7 and make public spaces more safe, inclusive, accessible and green. More recently, few guidelines have been tailored by our country offices, to address the specificities of regional contexts. Finally, we are now digitalising our tools and methods into e-learning self-paced modules that will be available online for open-access capacity building worldwide.

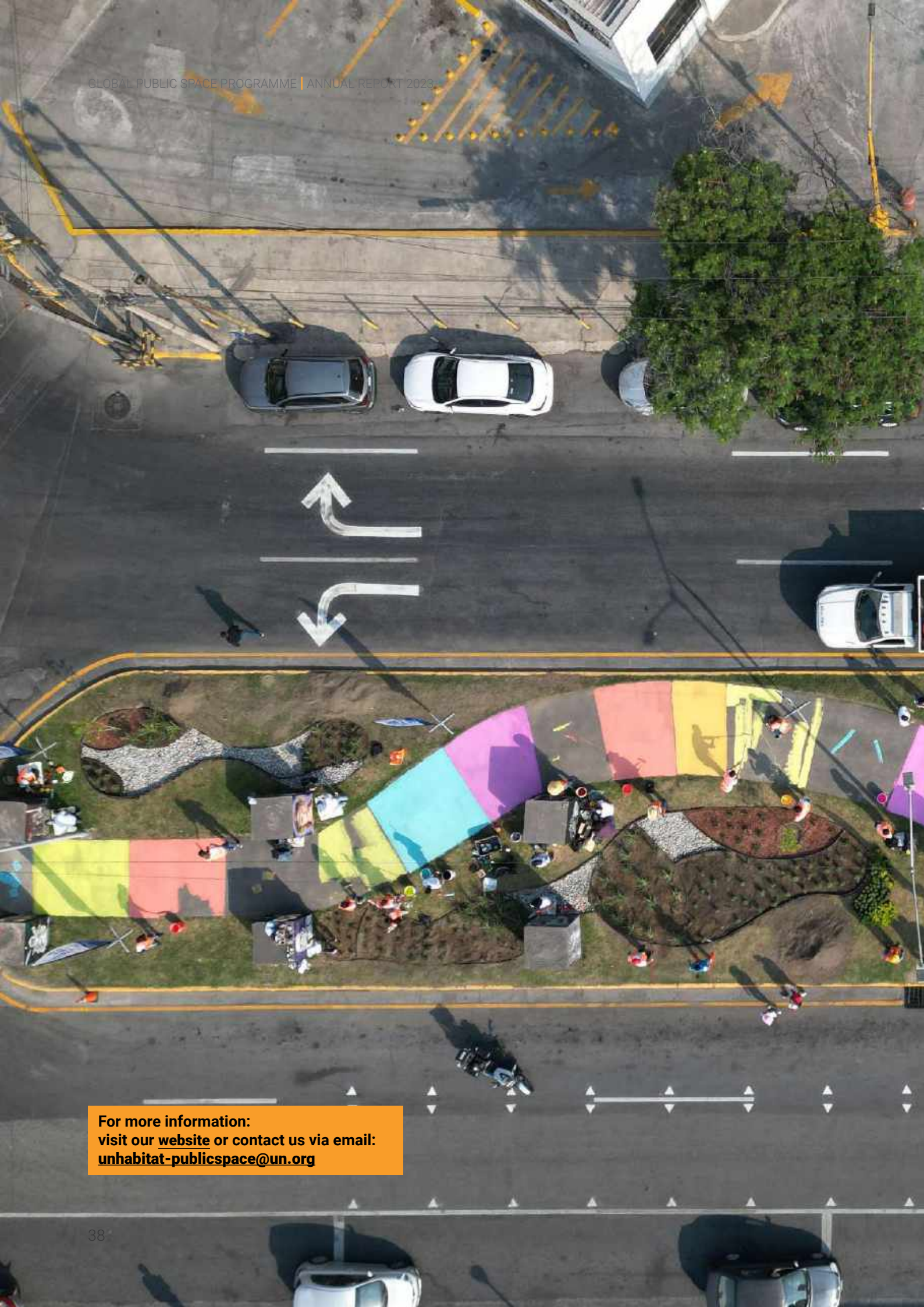
