Key Takeaways for the Guidelines

- empower people
- building trust
- local ownership
- foster community creativity
- make tech simple
- encourage collective urban experiences
- data **privacy** protection
- redefine success: micro success
- connect local and national processes
- balancing power: tech for good or for bad (no surveillance)





Shared responsibility and ownership based on good collaboration that creates <u>trust.</u>

LRG Consultation: GDC & IG PCSC



- The guidelines are an important **implementation tool** and can guide LRGs in the GDC's implementation strategies and plans as well as strengthen their position.
- **Digital divide** as main priority, ensuring that all residents, regardless of their socioeconomic status, have equal access to digital tools and services.
- Acknowledging differences in resources and capabilities among cities by equitable, technical and financial resource distribution and collaboration
- Across regions, speakers highlighted the need for inclusive, trustworthy technologies, that address societal issues.

Joint Global Communique







UN-Habitat

- New principle: Territorial development under Shared Prosperity.
- Add outcomes across principles from smart city development to UN Habitat's Strategic Plan.
- This definition of "people-centred smart city" will be referenced a lot in the future, what is people-centred across all areas?

International Organisations

General comments

- 1. Differentiate between Smart city and digital transformation strategies
- 2. Align with the Global Digital Compact and international standards

Stress people centred focus:

- make sure each thematic areas clearly states "components" to make it people-centred
- Include gender digital divide

UN-Habitat, UN & IO Consultations



Actors:

- 1. Prioritize local and regional governments
- 2. Suggested to ensure a network of cities is created

Tailored actions/duties:

1. Prioritize across duties based on specific contextual challenges

Thematic aspects

- 1. Need to include trade components and e-waste
- 2. Need to provide guidance on comprehensive index
- Differentiate between the environmental sustainability and the climate change
- 4. Detail how cities can respond to climate related challenges
- 5. Add shocks due to conflicts
- 6. emphasize the concept of data spaces
- 7. Shared prosperity is a bit general
- 8. defining the role of SMEs in the implementation of the guidelines and the development of smart cities

Implementation:

- an implementation tool shall be developed and operationalized
- 2. handing over the guidelines to cities may be overwhelming
- 3. Proposed a layering approach that would suggest the basic minimums and what each actor can do to contribute
