





















Participants expectations

Pre-WUF survey | 3,437 respondents

- **89%** of newcomers
- 25% to gain knowledge, 21% to network and 17% to gain skills
- 59% very familiar (32) or familiar (27) with localization
- Associate localization with culture, adaptation, sustainability

















Post-WUF survey (901 respondents)


- 94% very satisfied or satisfied

- 74% of respondents' perspective on localization changed after WUF12
















Dialogue 1 Housing our future

Called for elevating adequate housing as a priority in countries' national development agendas to respond to the global housing crisis across its facets, leveraging also land-use policies, integrated financing frameworks ensuring climate resilient responses.



Dialogue 2 Cities and the climate crisis

Underscored that cities are at the forefront of the climate crisis, both in terms of vulnerability and capacity to provide solutions and called for a strengthened role of cities and local and regional governments in national and global climate frameworks especially to address urgent financing for urban climate action.



Dialogue 3 Stronger together

Emphasized the key role of partnerships to achieve global goals at all levels and called for strengthened multilevel governance, community engagement, and inclusive policymaking while leveraging public-private investments for equitable urban development.



Dialogue 4

Financing Localization and Localizing Finance

Underscored the financing gaps and limitations cities face including limited access to international capital and own source revenue generation capacities, and called for innovative and untapped revenue streams to be leveraged better while improving financial and budget practices and greater financial accountability and transparency.



Dialogue 5 Putting people first in a digital era

Focused on leveraging technology to create inclusive, resilient cities, emphasizing the importance of being responsive to people's needs first and the need for robust governance, improved digital literacy, and addressing the digital divide.



Dialogue 6 The loss of home

Highlighted the challenges caused by urban displacement and emphasized the need for long-term investment in host communities beyond short-term aid through collective rebuilding to benefit both displaced people and host communities, also qualifying the loss of home and neighborhood means, placing homes and neighborhoods at the center of urban recovery





Assemblies and Roundtables

5 Assemblies and **13** Roundtables with key stakeholders

Called for the role of stakeholders to be better recognized

Emphasised the need for inclusive and participatory processes

Highted the opportunity to leverage their resources, skills and expertise



Ministerial Roundtable

70 Ministers and senior representatives

Focused on how to accelerate the implementation of the New Urban Agenda and the 2030 Agenda emphasizing the value of a multi-level collaborative approach to align SDG implementation with local realities, leveraging also public-private partnerships for urban infrastructure and housing investments







2026-29 Strategic Plan Survey




610 Respondents

81% agree that we cannot achieve the SDGs without resolving the global housing crisis


