The purpose of Request for Proposals is to solicit interest from existing or prospective Implementing Partners that wish to participate in UN-Habitat operation and contribute complementary resources (human resources, knowledge, funds, in-kind contributions, supplies and/or equipment) to achieving common objectives as outlined below and subsequently agreed in an Agreement of Cooperation

1. Background

These Terms of Reference outline the engagement of an Implementing Partner to support UN-Habitat work on urban recovery planning in Ukraine. The activities build upon the results of UN-Habitat's initial interventions in Myrhorod and Opishnia Hromadas, in Poltava Oblast in Ukraine.

Building on the urban planning documents developed by the municipalities during the first phase of the project, the Implementing Partner will collaborate with UN-Habitat to support the operationalisation of the Comprehensive Recovery Programmes in Myrhorod and Opishnia.

The activities will include development of an implementation roadmap, strategic planning, project design and public participation.

1.1 Overview of UN-Habitat

The United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat) is the United Nations programme for human settlements and sustainable urban development. UN-Habitat promotes socially and environmentally sustainable environments, working with partners to build inclusive, safe, resilient, and sustainable cities and communities. UN-Habitat promotes urbanisation as a positive transformative force for people and communities, reducing inequality, discrimination, and poverty. The main objective of UN-Habitat is the promotion of sustainable urbanization as a driver of development and peace, with a view to improving the living conditions of all, in accordance with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and New Urban Agenda (NUA).

1.2 Introduction to the project

Following the full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, the built environment and critical infrastructure in Ukraine have been severely impacted also causing large humanitarian concerns for millions of civilians, including internally displaced persons and refugees.

The Ukrainian Government (GoU) has a strong ambition to 'build back better', making progress towards the SDGs with a specific focus on addressing climate change. This includes a desire for an overhaul of existing towns and neighbourhoods, which typically are mono-functional with inadequate provision of public space and access to public services and functions. Particular considerations need to be directed towards the changing demographics (including the increased number of people with disabilities) and economics in the country. National, regional and local economic development strategies need to be developed and implemented, including approaches for urban and territorial regeneration on local level.

A sustainable reconstruction of Ukraine calls for the introduction of a systemic shift in the recovery planning and design of cities, towns and neighbourhoods in Ukraine, while also embedding measures to build capacity within the built environment professions, including urban planning.

The war has affected the availability of Ukrainian expertise within urban development, which was already scarce before the war, increasing the risk to jeopardise the ambition of Ukraine to Building Back Better. While several organisations have emerged to support the development of capacities in Ukraine on urban and territorial development and management, the access to knowledge and best practises on these issues is still limited.

The project aims at increasing access to global, regional and local cutting-edge knowledge, expertise as well as best practises that can inspire and enhance the capacities and expertise of Ukrainian stakeholders engaged in the recovery and reconstruction efforts.

1.3 UN-Habitat's response to Urban Recovery in Ukraine

In response to the urban recovery needs, UN-Habitat has established a country office in Ukraine to support the Ukrainian government in its recovery efforts. The project "*Towards Inclusive and Resilient Urban Recovery in Ukraine*" aims to contribute to the ongoing recovery and reconstruction efforts of the Government of Ukraine.

UN-Habitat collaborates with the Ministry for Communities and Territories Development, providing strategic and policy advice to inform recovery and development. UN-Habitat has

also established an Urban Lab in Ukraine, to support participatory urban recovery planning that promotes an effective, inclusive and resilient urban recovery through the creation of an enabling environment. The Urban Lab functions as a platform for engagement of local and international expertise and collaborators, addressing solutions for immediate (short-term), medium and long-term (strategic) recovery efforts.

Through its work, the Urban Lab operationalises the SDGs, the New Urban Agenda and other development frameworks into the built environment through localisation, development of strategies for urban transformation, and by bridging the gap between policy and physical implementation. The Urban Lab addresses the complexity of cities and regions' challenges by developing spatial and non-spatial strategic solutions, through evidence-based data analysis, in partnership with stakeholders, that will ensure sustainable urban development outcomes.

UN-Habitat also ambitions to support the establishment of an Urban Recovery Framework (URF) at the national level, as a key tool to create an enabling environment for urban recovery. The URF aims at facilitating the implementation of immediate and medium-term urban recovery interventions while laying the foundations for long-term resilience, based on diagnostics of key areas for urban recovery, including capacities for urban planning and built environment management, regulatory frameworks for recovery and reconstruction planning, housing, Housing, Land and Property rights, multi-level governance systems, smart cities and digital governance.

2. Proposed project

UN-Habitat invites proposals from not-for-profit organizations and public institutions to support **the operationalisation of the Comprehensive Recovery Programmes in Myrhorod and Opishnia**. The Comprehensive Recovery Programme is a legally binding planning document designed to guide the sustainable recovery and long-term development of the Hromada following the full-scale invasion by the Russian Federation.

This initiative includes three components: (1) **the development of an implementation roadmap** to support the operationalisation of the Comprehensive Recovery Programme, and (2) **the development of pilot projects and strategic initiatives**, and (3) **urban recovery knowledge exchange**. The objective is to support municipalities in translating their Comprehensive Recovery Programmes into concrete actions and to contribute to Ukraine's broader urban recovery and reconstruction efforts.

The targeted audience for the project encompasses all stakeholders involved in recovery and reconstruction efforts in urban areas. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Regional and Local governments;
- Practitioners and professionals;
- National and international organisations;
- General public.

The project aims to support local governments by implementing recovery efforts and increasing knowledge on the operationalisation of the Comprehensive Recovery Programmes in Ukraine. It seeks to strengthen the capacity of municipalities to operationalise plans and design projects and strategic initiatives, guided by the following principles:

- **Sustainability:** Deliverables must promote socially, environmentally and economically sustainable approaches, supporting both short-term recovery and long-term reconstruction. Deliverables should align with the "Build Back Better" and "Leaving No One Behind" principles and contribute to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (particularly SDG 11), as well as relevant national and local frameworks.

- **Inclusivity:** Deliverables should support inclusive approaches to planning and project design, ensuring that the needs of all population groups, including those at risk of vulnerability, are considered. These include women, youth, older persons, persons with disabilities, veterans, internally displaced persons, the Roma community, among others.
- **Local Ownership & Public Participation:** Deliverables must be developed through participatory and transparent processes led by the local government, with active involvement of civil society, community-based organisations, and residents throughout all stages of the project. Local authorities should be at the forefront of decision-making and coordination, ensuring that the recovery efforts reflect community priorities and are institutionally anchored.
- **Contextualization:** Deliverables must be relevant and tailored to the context of Ukraine and the specific needs of the targeted Hromadas. While international experiences and best practices (including UN-Habitat's global guidelines) should inform the work, they must be reviewed and appropriately adapted to local legal, social, economic, and cultural conditions.
- **Practicality and Scalability:** Proposed solutions should be feasible within the current operational environment and designed in a way that allows for replication or scaling up across other Hromadas and regions in Ukraine. Deliverables should be made in the Ukrainian and English language.

UN-Habitat requests that the deliverables consist of the following:

1. **Development of an implementation roadmap** to support the operationalisation of the Comprehensive Recovery Programme in Myrhorod and Opishnia Hromadas (1 report per Hromada), including:
 - a. Governance and Institutional Framework (roles and responsibilities of stakeholders, coordination mechanism, legal instruments/procedures)
 - b. Monitoring and Evaluation Mechanism;
 - c. Priority Actions and Phasing (short-, medium- and long-term);
 - d. Financing and Resource Mobilisation;
 - e. Capacity Development Plan;
 - f. Stakeholder Engagement and Communications.
2. **Development of pilot projects and strategic initiatives** (2-3 per Hromada):
 - a. Selection of pilot projects and strategic initiatives, through a participatory process, building on the endorsed Comprehensive Recovery Programmes
 - b. Preparation of project briefs (depending on the selection and type of the projects, as agreed with the partners, this can be concept notes, neighbourhood development design concepts, thematic analysis and strategies);
 - c. Implementation plan (including roles and responsibilities, financing and resource mobilisation)
3. **Urban recovery knowledge exchange**
 - a. Organisation of a regional (Oblast-level) event to share the findings and lessons learned (1 hybrid event)

Other deliverables: Expressions of Interest may include proposals of additional deliverables aligned with the above-listed principles and within the available project budget.

In addition to the deliverables, the appointed Implementing Partner will be required to:

- Attend regular progress review meetings with UN-Habitat
- Deliver progress reports and financial reports

- Collaborating with UN-Habitat to develop social media posts aimed at increasing the visibility and outreach of the deliverables

3. Proposals

UN-Habitat invites proposals for the design and delivery of the activities described above.

Proposals should include the following documents:

1. Certificate of registration, both in country of origin and in country of operation;
2. Certified true copy of proof of non-Profit;
3. Clear organisation profile and structure of the organisation indicating:
 - o Organisation's vision, mission and objectives;
 - o Management structure;
 - o Members of the Governing Board and their Designations duly certified by the Corporate Secretary, or its equivalent.
4. The organisation's constitution and/or by-laws;
5. The organisation's latest annual report;
6. A certified true copy of the original Audited Account Statement for the last two years and latest annual report;

8. The list of projects executed in the last 2 years, completed or ongoing;
9. References from past donors;
10. CVs of management staff, technical and non-technical staff, finance and accounting staff that will be involved in the project;
11. The organisation's project monitoring policies and procedures;

13. The organisation's anti-fraud policy and procedures;

 - o The budget proposal should indicate the support/contribution the organization is willing to make including, cash and in kind (contribution in terms of staff time, office space and equipment and other support in cash and in-kind should be expressed in monetary terms).

The Implementing Partner is requested to specify the following in their proposal, including demonstration of relevant experience from similar assignments within or beyond Ukraine:

- o Team lead/focal point for the collaboration with UN-Habitat;
- o Technical lead(s) (if other than the Team Lead);
- o Expertise required to cover the activities;
- o Other additional expertise as proposed by the Implementing Partner for delivery of the services.

The delivery of the services would need to consider potential risks and influence from external factors that impact on delivery of the services. The Implementing Partner is requested to assess and outline such potential risks associated with delivery of the services, including risk mitigation measures. Some of the risks could include, but is not limited to:

- Rotation of staff within the Implementing Partner and/or within selected stakeholders affecting their capacity to engage;
- Unexpected lack of internal capacity to deliver the services.

The working language of UN-Habitat's project in Ukraine is English which will be used for all communication with UN-Habitat, including agreements, planning, delivery and follow up of activities. Further, reporting of activities should be done in English. The key deliverables will be prepared in English and in Ukrainian.

Proposals should also indicate the organisation's willingness and possibility to have a separate bank account for the funds provided by UN-Habitat.

3. Proposals from applicants failing to provide the complete information to fulfill the basic eligibility criteria will be considered non-responsive.
